

With the Fairhope CHaRM now open and construction underway on the new Magnolia CHaRM, SWDA is expanding convenient recycling options across Baldwin County. The Magnolia location will accept both standard and hard-torecycle materials, such as electronics and batteries. As use of the Fairhope CHaRM increases, the recycling drop-off site behind the Fairhope Courthouse will close. Did you know that most yard signs are made from Plastic #5, a recyclable material? Instead of throwing them away, you can help reduce waste by recycling these signs properly.

To recycle your yard signs, contact your local municipality to find the nearest drop-off location that accepts Plastic #5. Once you know where to take them, we can coordinate with the municipality to make sure the signs are processed and recycled correctly.

By recycling your yard signs, you're helping conserve resources, reduce landfill waste, and support a more sustainable community. Every small action counts—thank you for doing your part!



Where To Find Us in the Community



Curbside Recycling



Want curbside recycling but not sure if it's available in your area? Check out this map to see when service will start near you.

Curbside recycling makes it easy to reduce waste and protect the environment—sign up today and start recycling right at your doorstep!

- 1. Daphne (inside/outside city limits, west of 181 and south of I-10
- 2. Belforest, Daphne (inside/outside city limits, east of 181 and north I-10), Malbis, and Spanish Forts Stonebridge Active
- 3. Loxley and Summerdale (inside/outside of city limits) **Starts October**6^{th,} 2025
- 4. Bromley, Carpenter, Crossroads, Hurricane, Spanish Fort (inside/outside city limits) Stapleton, Steelwood, Pine Haven, Whitehouse Forks **Starts December 1**st, **2025**
- 5. Barnwell, Clay City, Fairhope (outside city limits), Marlow, and Magnolia Springs (inside/outside city limits) **Starts February 2nd**, 2026
- 6. Lillian, Silverhill (inside/outside city limits), and Ono Island **Starts**April 6th, 2026
- 7. Bon Secour and Foley (outside city limits), Gulf Shores (outside city limits) Starts June 1st, 2026
- 8. Elsanor, Gateswood, Robertsdale (inside/outside city limits), Rosinton, Seminole **Starts August 3rd, 2026**
- 9. Bay Minette (inside/outside city limits), Blacksher, Georgetown, Gopher Hill, Latham, Little River, Lottie, Phillipsville, Rabun, Redtown, Stockton, Tensaw, and Vangordon Starts October 5th, 2026

What Can You Recycle in Baldwin County and Where?



As part of our ongoing initiative, we are now accepting the following materials for recycling at our Materials Recovery Facility (MRF). Residents can conveniently recycle these items in several ways:

- At any of our existing recycling drop-off locations throughout the community
- At one of our upcoming CHaRM (Center for Hardto-Recycle Materials) sites, which will be opening soon to expand recycling options
- And through future curbside programs that will be launched in additional areas across the county By utilizing these services, you are helping to save space in the landfill, conserve resources, and protect our environment for future generations. Stay tuned for updates on new locations and expanded services as we continue to grow our recycling efforts.
